HOW DO I APPLY?

Long Road welcomes applications from all students, regardless of the school you currently attend. All applications are considered equally; however, the application process differs based on the school you currently attend.

Please ensure you check which of the below applies to you before submitting your application:

- Applicants who currently study at a <u>Cambridge Area 14 – 19 Partnership</u> school should <u>apply online via MyChoice@16.</u>
 - A list of all CAP schools can be found <u>here.</u>
- Applicants who do not currently study at a CAP school must apply directly to Long Road.

Our team will transfer all MyChoice@16 applications to the Admissions+ platform after our January deadline. Your login information will be sent to you via email.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

Once you have submitted your application, it will be reviewed by a member of our admissions team. Should you meet the criteria for a study programme with us, you will be invited to attend an Advice and Guidance Meeting where your chosen courses, goals for the future, and interests outside of education will be discussed.

Shortly after your meeting you will be sent a conditional offer via your Admissions+ account. Remember, you can accept offers from multiple colleges, and we recommend you do just that! Accepting all the offers you receive means you will keep all your options open until GCSE Results Day, when you must make your final decision on where to study.

If you have accepted your offer, you will later be invited to attend a Welcome Day with us in the summer to try out your courses, meet your teachers, and get a real feel for what it is like to be a Long Road student.



OUR COURSES

At Long Road, we offer a wide selection of courses ranging from STEM, Humanities, Visual and Performance Arts to Social Sciences, Language, and Sport.

Our curriculum includes both A Levels and Applied subjects. The main difference between these is the way that you're assessed: Applied subjects will contain an element of coursework assessment, whereas A Levels are largely assessed by exams at the end of your 2 years of study.

This means for an Applied course you will have to work continuously towards assessments throughout your 2 years of study whereas on an A Level course, your exams will be held at the end of your 2 years.





APPLIED SUBJECTS

You may have heard the myth that Applied subjects are an easier option. How easy you find A Level or Applied subjects will depend on your preferred working and assessment style – if you thrive in exams then A Levels may be 'easier' for you, but if you prefer coursework then an Applied subject could suit you better.

Universities typically view Applied subjects as equivalent to A Levels, so you're not disadvantaging yourself or restricting your progression options by studying an Applied course.

If there is a specific university or degree course you would like to study then it is worth looking up the entry requirements to see if they ask specifically for certain subjects or qualifications as this may inform your sixth form course choices.

Choosing Your Study Programme

If you are currently completing your GCSEs, you will be applying for either our Level 3 (A Levels and Applied) or Level 2 (GCSEs and Applied) courses.

You can select from three different pathways at Level 3 to best suit your career aims and interests. You may choose an A Level only route, an Applied only route or a pathway that includes A Level and Applied courses. Your place at Long Road is determined by your grades, school reference and attending an Advice and Guidance Meeting. Each course offered includes entry requirements, which must be met in order to gain a place with us. Our basic entry requirements are:

- A Levels: Five GCSEs at Grade 5
- Applied: Five GCSEs at Grade 4

LIFE AS A LONG ROAD STUDENT

Studying at Long Road is different to studying at school. We recognise you as an individual and treat you as an adult. Not all of your learning will be in classrooms; you'll hear lectures and attend workshops led by experts related to your study programme and future goals.

At Long Road you will be taught by highly qualified and experienced subject specialist teachers. Our small class sizes (maximum 26 students) allow for high levels of student participation in mature group discussions, encouraging you to develop and express your opinions.

The college day runs from 9am – 4:10pm, but unlike school you won't spend all day in classes. Independent study periods allow you to work on assignments, carry out research and explore your course in depth outside of the classroom. You will have 3 lessons per subject per week, meaning you spend just over 14 hours per week in classes.

We recommend 4 hours per subject per week for independent study, totalling 12 hours per week, and an additional 1 hour planning for the week ahead. This adds up to 27 hours, 10 hours short of a working week. If you use your independent study periods wisely you'll be able to keep every evening and weekend free to enjoy!


STUDENT SUPPORT

We understand that starting at college is a big step and can feel overwhelming, which is totally normal! We have lots of ways of supporting students at Long Road as your welfare and wellbeing is our highest priority!

Our Student Care, Guidance and Progression team includes a team of trained Designated Safeguarding leads, a Wellbeing co-ordinator and a college counsellor, all of whom can support you in college; or we can signpost students to appropriate external therapeutic and counselling services where needed.

We have a varied programme of wellbeing activities on offer throughout the year including active sessions, creative ones, therapy dogs and opportunities to learn a new skill. These will focus on the 5 Ways to Wellbeing which are simple steps that we can do every day to help improve our ability to manage when feeling stressed and overwhelmed.

Students will also be offered small group activities to help them explore techniques for managing a variety of challenges such as generalised anxiety, social anxiety, caring responsibilities, and bereavement. Sometimes we may use creative activities or meet in a quiet space outside to deliver these sessions for an immediate boost to wellbeing!



Additional Learning Needs

Our team of qualified specialist tutors can provide formal and informal assessments of students' learning needs. For students with EHC plans we develop individual learning programmes that are regularly reviewed and adjusted as needed.

Students with English as their second language are offered extra tuition with a specialist teacher.

A range of IT equipment and software is available to support students' studies, including text-to-speech and mind-mapping programmes.


