Course summary	The GCSE Geography course is based on a balanced framework of physical and human geography. It allows students to investigate the link between the two themes, and approach and examine the interaction between the man-made and natural worlds.
	Year 9 content  Students will study The Challenge of Natural Hazards which includes tectonic hazards, weather hazards and climate change and the Changing Economic World_which includes economic development and quality of life, reducing the global development gap, economic development in a named Lower Income Country (LIC) and economic change in the UK.
What will students learn?	Students will study The Living World, which includes ecosystems, tropical rainforests and cold environments. They will also study The Challenge of Resource Management which includes global resource management, resources in the UK and food, and Urban Issues and Challenges which includes the global pattern of urban change, urban growth in a named LIC, urban challenges in the UK and sustainable development of urban areas.
	Students will study Physical landscapes in the UK, which includes the physical diversity of the UK, coastal landscapes and glacial landscapes. Students will also study an, often controversial, geographical issue using a pre-release resource booklet made available by AQA twelve weeks before the Paper 3 exam. Students will go on a field trip to collect primary data to complete two geographical enquiries, one human and one physical.
How will students be assessed?	Exam Assessment: The GCSE Geography course is linear and students will sit three exams at the end of the course.  Paper 1: Living with the physical environment assesses The challenge of natural hazards, The living world, Physical landscapes in the UK and Geographical skills.  Paper 2: Challenges in the human environment assesses Urban issues and challenges, The changing economic world, The challenge of resource management and Geographical skills.  Paper 3: Geographical Applications assesses the Issue evaluation, using the pre-release resource booklet, Fieldwork and Geographical skills.
